She Lied Like A Trooper

One of the charges levelled against the Bible from time to time is the seeming contradiction between what is forbidden and what is later done with Heaven's nod.

Rahab is a good example of this.

(You can read all about Rahab in the book of Joshua, chapter two, and also read God's comment on it in the book of James chapter 2, verse 25)

There is no getting around the fact. Rahab had a choice to make. She could tell the truth and send two godly men to their death or she could lie like a trooper.

Rahab chose the better portion and lied like a trooper. She clearly lied and God clearly praised her for it, saying it was worthy of imitation.

This is the kind of situation the moralist hates (A "moralist" being one who applauds themselves for all the good things they do). In Rahab's case, either choice meant some imperfection.

For the moralist, it is important that he stands or falls on his own goodness. For the moralist, the question is always, "How can I come out of this looking squeaky clean."



There is another way. Instead of waving our own germ-free hands about in the air, we rest on the perfect nail-printed hands of someone else, someone willing to stand in our place – should we ever be brought to trial for the things our hands have done.

In this case, preservation of our own purity is not the central issue. The central issue is knowing who to call up in your defence.

God had made a promise to rescue Israel. Rahab believed it and acted accordingly. This same faith puts its trust in Jesus Christ: the Perfect Man, sent into the world to stand trial on behalf of unclean people.

Rahab lied because she believed God and considered operating against Him a far greater evil.

On the last day, no man will be given the golden handshake for his own moral purity. The handshake is given to those who believed in the goodness of God.

Down but not Out


"Weeping may endure for a night, but joy cometh in the morning." (Psalm 30:5)

If you have ever been down, depressed, perhaps even longing for life to end, you may appreciate the life of William Cowper.

William Cowper (pron.'Cooper') was born in exciting times. He lived through the voyages of Captain James Cook, the French Revolution and the American War of Independence.

He is best known for his magnificent hymns and his writings which included 'The Task' and 'The Castaway'.



He was a firm believer in the Gospel and all of its promises, and yet, was probably one of the most miserable, melancholy people you could ever meet. He attempted suicide several times and it was only divine intervention through friends, low tides, weak wrists and weak ropes that kept this poor man alive.

There are many possible reasons for his lifelong battle with depression - brutalised in school by older boys, the death of his mother at age six, and a largely absent father. All may have contributed to the sadness of his soul, yet William lived.

We like to think we are in control of life: That we can make the happiness happen. We aren't – and we can't. Sadness, depression - and grief - can hit suddenly. What do you do? Where do you anchor your soul when strength gives way to sadness? William once wrote,

"Ye fearful saints, fresh courage take, the clouds you so much dread...

Are big with mercy and shall break in blessings on your head."

He was echoing another man who had suffered with great melancholy. A man called Asaph who sang of the anchor that steadied his soul in unsteady times.

"My heart and my strength may fail, but God is the Strength of my heart, and my portion forever. For me, it is good to be near God." (Psalm 73)

The roots of William's endurance, like Asaph, were not in himself. They were anchored in someone who had also come into this world, stricken and acquainted with grief, an anchor that you can hold on to – or better yet, who will hold on to you – when (not if) your heart and your strength fail.

Jesus did not promise an easy life, free from pain. But He did promise to uphold us and be with us in the pain, so that, in the end, we endure to eternal life where every tear will be wiped away.


