Growing Old

Is age an enemy? For many age is something to be fought and feared.

While we are young, hope tends to flourish. Each birthday means growing stronger, smarter and more productive. But how do you sustain hope when it becomes obvious that the House is starting to creak and sway? What do you do when you've reached the summit of physical and mental fitness?

How do you maintain Hope in the later chapters of life?

For Pierre Cornielle, a French playwright famous for his tragedies, old age was a reason to despair. Growing old for him meant increasing darkness and loss.

"Oh rage! Oh despair! Oh age, my enemy" Pierre Corneille

By contrast, the wise King Solomon, while he acknowledged the very real difficulties of old age, thought that growing older should lead to increase.



Cornielle saw it as approaching midnight, while Solomon saw it as approaching the noonday sun.

The key difference between these two men seems to be in the object of their hope.

C.S. Lewis is a most helpful thinker here and asks, "What is it that a man in love wants when he

"What is it that a man in love wants when he courts a girl, woos her and becomes engaged to her with a view to marriage? Answer: He wants more of the relationship that he already has.

He wants the deepest, richest, most satisfying mode of togetherness with her that is possible for him to have. In other words, he wants more of what he has already."

If our hopes in life are pinned to things which fade away, then age means the demise of hope; it means increasing darkness. For Solomon and for Lewis, age, along with its difficulties, meant drawing nearer to the Object of their Affections: The unfading gift of Eternal Life and a Resurrected Friend. Where does your hope lie?

Terrified By Weakness

"The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among you, from your brothers; it is to him you shall listen; just as you desired of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly, when you said..."

"Let me not hear again the voice of the Lord my God or see this great fire any more, lest I die." (Deuteronomy 18:15-16)

When God visited His people at Horeb, He did it with Peals of Thunder, Fire from Heaven and a terrifying voice.

The people panicked and asked God to come up with another way of communicating. So He did.

He sent them a Prophet, a flesh and blood man they could relate to who would say pretty much the same things.

He came in weakness and gentleness. They didn't like it at all. They wanted signs from Heaven.



God warned them that when He came, they must be careful to listen to Him. They didn't. People usually don't admire or give heed to apparent weakness.

The God at Horeb they could hear but could not bear. God en-fleshed in meekness and lowliness they would neither hear nor bear. "Depart from me Lord, for I am a sinful man."

They found the Kindness and Patience of Jesus intolerable. They found His apparent weakness and gentleness an insult. Jesus didn't call down fire from Heaven. He healed with a touch.

We live in a world that thinks that the power is in the noise. Might makes right, and all that. We just don't handle weakness very well. Perhaps this is why we feel the need to hide the weak, the infirm and the helpless from our view.

Jesus could bring on the noise. James and John were hoping He *would* call down a little fire from the sky. Jesus *could* call on a Legion of Angels, and Peter, sword in hand, would have been delighted. But Jesus *didn't*.

Jesus was crucified in weakness yet lives by the Power of God. Rather than deny our weakness, Jesus came into this world to overcome it. He became weak so that we might become strong.

This is true Power. Power clothed in weakness.


